Public Health: What You Need to Know

SURVEY

- Southwestern Public Health is conducting a feasibility study to assess the need, support, and service models related to local consumption and treatment services.

MEASLES

- On February 22, Southwestern Public Health <u>issued an alert</u> regarding a measles workplace exposure in Oxford County.
- The Public Health Agency of Canada reminds healthcare providers that the MMR vaccine is authorized for individuals 12 months of age and older, but **may be given to infants as young as 6 months of age** travelling to areas where measles is circulating.
- 2 additional doses (a total of 3) must be administered after the child is 12 months old to ensure long-lasting immunity.

PHO REPORT: SMOKING AND ALCOHOL

• Public Health Ontario published the <u>Burden of Health Conditions Attributable to Smoking and Alcohol by Public</u> <u>Heath Unit</u> on February 6. Key points:

- Each year in Ontario, smoking cases approximately 16,673 deaths, 68,046 hospitalizations, and 125,384 emergency department visits. These make up 17% of deaths, 8.7% of hospitalizations, and 3.4% of emergency department visits from all causes in people aged 35 and older.
- Alcohol consumption causes approximately 4,330 deaths, 22,009 hospitalizations, and 194,692 emergency department visits each year in Ontario. These make up 4.3% of deaths, 2.1% of hospitalizations, and 3.7% of emergency department visits from all causes in people aged 15 and older.
- Comprehensive tobacco and alcohol control strategies are needed to prevent and reduce smoking and alcohol consumption.
