Public Health: What You Need to Know

CHANGES TO LYME DISEASE TESTING

- As of April 1, the PHO lab updated its testing algorithm for Lyme disease. Review the <u>clinical guidance document</u> for full details. Resources:

MULTI-DRUG RESISTANT GONORRHEA GUIDANCE

- In April, the <u>CMOH issued a memo</u> regarding multi-drug resistant gonorrhea infection guidance. For all patients with suspected gonorrhea infection:
 - Specimen Collection Guidance:
 - Collect swabs for N. gonorrhoeae culture <u>as well as</u> specimens for NAAT testing from all potentially exposed sites (e.g., urethral/cervical, pharyngeal, rectal).
 - Swabs should be received within 48 hours if possible, but will be accepted by PHOL up to 72 hours after collection. View PHO test information index for full details.
 - Test of Cure Guidance:
 - Per the <u>Canadian Guidelines on Sexually Transmitted Infections</u>, test of cure is recommended for <u>ALL</u> positive cases at <u>ALL</u> positive sites.
 - Perform culture 3-7 days after completion of treatment.
 - If culture is not available, test of cure by NAAT is accepted and to be performed 2-3 weeks post-treatment. Contact PHO for questions at 1-877-604-4567 or customerservicecentre@oahpp.ca.
- If multi-drug resistant gonorrhea infection is detected, contact Public Health for case management.

CHANGES TO HIV TESTING GUIDANCE

- The new Ontario Guidelines for Providers Offering HIV Testing (2023) recommend streamlined testing and counselling for people at risk of HIV infection, a stronger focus on identifying symptoms of acute and chronic HIV, and routine testing for members of populations with higher rates of HIV.
- The guidelines also reduce the current window period for definitive diagnosis of HIV from 3 months to 6 weeks.
