Summary Description of IPAC Lapse	 Barber fails to change single use razor for shaving hair on necks and faces of an unknown number of multiple clients per day. Such razor was not cleaned and disinfected between clients. Razor blades are designed to be single-use and then discarded. "Shaving Soap mixture" and brush for application are shared between clients. Inadequate cleaning and disinfection of semi-critical equipment and instruments that are reused on clients—the blade holder was not being processed between clients. Infection risk: There is a risk of Blood Borne Infection (BBI) as well as the risk of transmitting skin infections from one client to another. While the infection risk of barbering and hairstyling is low, procedures involving the use of a razor carry risk. Blood does not need to be visibly present for transmission of microorganisms to occur.

Date any order(s) or directive(s) were issued to the owners/operators	barber shop with mostly walk-ins. - During the inspection, the following IPAC issues was observed by SWPH Public Health Inspector: 1) Razor was not changed between clients 2) Razor handle was not cleaned and disinfected between clients. 3) Public Health Inspector closed the premises on June 16 with re-opening permitted once the operator demonstrated adequate knowledge and required IPAC processes.
